How are students notified of acceptance?	Students will be notified of their acceptance via an email through the online application portal. Acceptance may take a few weeks after submission of all documentation.

English Proficiency Requirements Undergraduate Applicants	<p>Confirmation of the student’s English Language proficiency is required. This evidence may include one or more of the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Internet TOEFL (iBT) score of 80 or higher, with minimum score of 18 in each section. 2. IELTS score, minimum overall band of 6.5, with no section lower than 6.5. 3. Institutional TOEFL (ITP) score of 550 or higher, with minimum score of 50 in each section 4. Cambridge English B2 First (FCE), C1 Advanced (CAE), or C2 Advanced (CPE) with minimum English Scale scores of: Reading – 180, Listening – 180, Speaking – 180, Writing – 175 5. Duolingo English Test: overall score of 115 with minimum sub score of 110 6. Documentation from the applicant’s home university that 50% or more of the applicant’s university-level coursework has been instructed in English 7. Documentation from the applicant’s home university that provides evidence of an objective measurement by which English proficiency has been determined- this will be considered on case-by-case basis. 8. English is the applicant’s first language If a test is not listed above, it will NOT be accepted by Marquette University as proof of English language proficiency. No exceptions will be made.

<p>Housing Options</p>	<p>Students will live in the global village, Residence Halls, or off-campus housing. While Marquette does its best to accommodate housing requests, based on the number of student applicants and capacity, we cannot guarantee placement in the first-choice housing.</p> <p>Global Village Global Village (Campus Town Apartments) is a very convenient place to live while studying at Marquette University. These are fully furnished, and heating and water utilities are included in the rental fee. Apartments contain two bedrooms. Each bedroom is shared by two students. Students live with Marquette Students and other international exchange students. Undergraduate students are given preference for global village. Due to capacity limitations, it is more likely students would be placed in the Global village for the spring semester. During fall semester, Global Village often reaches capacity. There are many residence halls available with a range of amenities. All students living in residence halls are required to have a meal plan. It is preferred that only students 20 years of age or younger, who are within their first two years of study at the University level, choose to live in a residence hall.
